This year's annual picnic began with friends and family honoring the memory of two legendary Canyon hikers, Harvey Butchart and George Steck. The services began with a few words from Joe Alston, Superintendent of Grand Canyon National Park; then Lee Albertson and Tom Myers introduced



several members of the Butchart Family, which included many grandchildren and great grandson Sean Thomas. Next, John Azar introduced members



of the Steck family, which included sons Stan from Alaska and Mike from Colorado, and daughter Ricia from New Mexico. Others then shared their favorite times with Harvey and/or George, including: Tom Myers and Elias Butler, who are working with the family on a biography of Harvey Butchart; John Azar, Adair and Don Peterson and Don Mattox, close friends and hiking partners of George Steck; and Bil Vandergraff, Park Ranger; Jim Ohlman, climber and backpacker; and Bruce Aiken, artist and inner-Canyon resident. Lee Albertson followed up the individual remembrances with a few choice words before everyone joined in the scattering of the ashes of Harvey and his wife Roma (who passed shortly before Harvey).

GCHS Outings for 2004

July 17: Second Annual North Rim Campout at the historic Ranger Station at Jacob Lake. This will be a fun get together. We are celebrating the 20th Anniversary of the beginning of the Grand Canyon Historical Society.

When: early afternoon to sunset Where: Historic Ranger Station

Jacob Lake (see page 4 for directions)

Festivities begin in the early afternoon of Saturday, July 17. Matt Zweifel will demonstrate the art of flint knapping. Prehistoric people of the canyon knapped sharp edge on rock for spear points, arrowheads, and scrappers.

Also that afternoon, Neil Weintraub will be there to show us how to make split-twig figurines. These were found in caves in the Canyon, and are evidence of a people who were in the Canyon 3,000 to 4,000 years ago (other evidence includes basket fragments, sandals, and projectile points).

By late that afternoon, John Azar will have a fire ready for cooking. He will bring and cook a spit roast, corn on the cob, and potato salad. Bring something that would go with that, like dessert. Also, bring chairs and something to drink.

There is space behind the Jacob Lake Ranger Station to set up tents or sleep in your vehicle. There is a restroom and a hose bib for water. So, plan to share your Canyon stories beneath the starlit night with your fellow pioneers. We hope that some of you who were part of the original Society will be there to share your stories.

Ron Clayton is best known as the "Dean of the Mule College" at Grand Canyon but his commitment to community service is most appreciated by his fellow citizens. For years he has volunteered his time and efforts in northern Arizona as an auctioneer for charitable causes. Ron has hosted so many of these events he cannot remember them all. Such organizations as Chambers of Commerce, Rotary, the Baptist Church, and fundraisers for sick and injured individuals in dire need have benefited from his dedication to service. For 20 years, Ron has been a fixture at the Grand Canyon Chamber's 4th of



July Parade auction and has also helped raise nearly \$35,000 in Williams for cancer research.

He would probably best like to be remembered for the handicap program he established with the mules in the Canyon. His work with Make A Wish Foundation and several other organizations for the handicapped as well as many individuals gives him the most pleasure. For this work he received the North American Mule Association Lifetime Achievement Award in 2000 and other awards from the Handicapped Association of the North American Horseman Association.

For the past 10 years, children of the community have benefited from his knowledge as a Sunday School teacher for the Baptist Church. And, as if helping people is not enough, Ron is the resident small animal vet and many of the community's pets have been recipients of his caring services.

Edwin "Eddie" D. McKee is remembered primarily for his scholarly contributions to biology and geology studies in the Grand Canyon. Most of his contemporaries are no longer with us but the memory of his community service lingers on. Eddie became the park naturalist in 1929, and he and his wife Barbara became active

members of the community from the moment they arrived.

Eddie lent his time and efforts to projects and people in the Village (such as building the Community Building) and through his church and other organizations. Always willing to lend a hand through time and money, he could be counted on to support community efforts and the needy when his backcountry duties and studies allowed. Fund raisers and programs at the Community Building almost always included Eddie.

Before moving on to positions in higher education, Eddie left his mark on the Grand Canyon community as someone who not only dearly loved the Canyon but as a caring and more than willing supporter of the residents and those in need.

We are deeply indebted to folks like Ron and Eddie for helping to make the Grand Canyon community a better place in which to live and work. *Note: For a complete list of awardees, see the Society's web pages at GrandCanyonHistory.org.*


