Community Service Project

On Saturday, August 21, a small but enthusiastically energized group representing the Grand Canyon Hikers & Backpackers Association and the Grand Canyon Historical Society reported for a day of community service to Grand Canyon National Park. Many thanks are needed for Leah McGinnis and Nick Hardigg, who did the planning and organizing for this event. Jennifer Chain, manager of the Grand Canyon Recreation Center and Sherry Schmidt, National Park Service maintenance worker, were also on hand to help with the day's activities.

It was an absolutely gorgeous day and amazingly, for August, not too warm. There were two projects planned. One was landscaping on the grounds of the Grand Canyon Recreation Center, and the other was a trash pick-up along the rim from the West Rim interchange back towards the Village. Sherry coordinated that event. Ann Reynolds, from Prescott, commented at how thankful people were to see the trash being picked up along the edge of the canyon. Many people stopped to thank them for their efforts.

Meanwhile, back at the Recreation Center, a group of pitchfork and shovel wielding volunteers spread wood chips throughout the area at the front of the Recreation Center. Arizona Public Service had been conducting a tree removal and trimming project along power line roads at Grand Canyon. This debris had been run through a chipper, and the fresh wood chips had been deposited in piles in front of the Recreation Center at the beginning of the summer. Nick had not been able to obtain a work crew prior to this, so he was as excited as a kid with a new bike to have us out there letting the chips fall where they may!

Some local Grand Canyon School students also stopped by to help. Nick even coerced a few Recreation Center employees into coming out to help. Some edging work was also completed along the sidewalk that leads into the Center, which involved moving telephone pole pieces and large rocks. Luckily, this part of the project was led by physical therapist Tom Martin, so no one was in danger of throwing out their back! We successfully spread 3 huge piles of chips. Although there was certainly more to do, what was done made a much more attractive appearance to the front of the Center.

GCHS Outings for 2004

September 18: *Harvey: The Adventures, Tragedies and Legacy of Grand Canyon's Greatest Hiker* by Elias Butler and Tom Myers. Held in conjunction with the 3rd Annual Prescott Book Festival.

John Harvey Butchart (1907-2002) walked over more of Grand Canyon than any other alive or dead. The father, husband and college professor began teaching at Northern Arizona University in 1944, visited Grand Canyon not long after, and quickly developed a compelling obsession: to become the authority on Grand Canyon's then-unknown backcountry. Over the next four decades, he hiked over 12,000 miles in the Canyon, eventually publishing three guidebooks that hikers still use today for the wealth of backcountry information. Harvey's name is synonymous with hard-core, remote and exciting off-trail exploration in Grand Canyon.

Tom Myers and Elias Butler have teamed up to write the definitive biography on Harvey Butchart, expected to be published in 2005.

Elias Butler is a journalist as well as a photographer, whose works have appeared in publications like *National Geographic Adventure Magazine*, *Arizona Highways*, *Backpacker Magazine*, *Plateau Journal* and *High Country News*.

Tom Myers is also the co-author of *Fateful Journey* -*Injury and Death on the Colorado River in Grand Canyon* (along with Christopher C. Becker and Lawrence E. Stevens) and the co-author of *Over the Edge - Death in Grand Canyon* (along with Michael Ghiglieri).

A Special Friendship

Our friendship with Bill and Sibyl Suran began in 1980 and continues today. We had visited Arizona for business conventions on previous occasions. The first time we had extended our vacation time and driven north as far as Flagstaff, on our way to the Grand Canyon, but it snowed overnight and we had rented a Pinto so decided to head south to Tucson instead, not wanting to take a chance of snow at the Grand Canyon. After all, we were two easterners in unfamiliar territory. Besides, we had already had more snow and ice than usual back home and warm sunshine won out.

On other visits to Phoenix, we had only a few days of our own time to tour bits of southern Arizona and began to wonder how people had made the change from other parts of the country to Arizona, so we wrote to the newspaper asking for comments on that subject. We had a response from a couple who had moved to Prescott Valley from Maine, and still correspond with them, and we received a response from Sibyl Suran telling how she and Bill had fallen in love with Flagstaff and decided that would be their home.

In 1980, we met Bill and Sibyl and they introduced us to Flagstaff, the Grand Canyon (with a picnic on the rim in February), Wupatki, Walnut Canyon, etc., and our friendship began. A year or two later, our nephew and family moved to Tucson and our annual vacation destination was Arizona, spending time in both Tucson and Flagstaff, always with a stop in Sedona, and we could understand how someone could acclimate to Arizona. After several years of visiting, we started thinking how nice it would be if we could rent a "closet" somewhere so we would not have to pack so many clothes each time. A few years later, we found a town home in Tucson, purchased it, and had our "closet" for future visits, until we moved here permanently in 1994.

Through the years, the Surans and we have corresponded. They even visited us in New England to enjoy some of the sights. They have introduced us to so many wonderful areas of northern Arizona that we may never have visited, and our memories of those experiences are rich with visits to Monument Valley, Kayenta and Third Mesa, Canyon DeChelly, Page, Lake Powell, and so many other places.
