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Ambrose Means and the 1917 Cougar Hunt

Ambrose Means was noted for his world championship roping and for accompanying Buffalo Jones on two of his African expeditions. Ambrose and Buffalo Jones, along with roper Marshall D. Lovelace and their photographer, roped and filmed the wild animals of Africa. Former President Roosevelt commended Ambrose on his marvelous roping feats in Africa.

In 1910, Ambrose went on his first African expedition with Buffalo Jones. On this expedition, they brought back a lion for the New York Bronx Zoo.

In 1911-12, Ambrose performed in The Young Buffalo Wild West Shows, which also headlined Annie Oakley. Tom Mix also performed in this Wild West Show in 1912.

In 1913, Ambrose performed in The 101 Ranch Wild West Show.

In 1914, Ambrose

accompanied Buffalo Jones on a second African expedition.

For over 18 years, Ambrose guided hunting trips in and around Arizona, Idaho and New Mexico. He also guided hunting trips for Emery Kolb.

Linda Thompson's presentation about her grandfather, Ambrose Means, was outstanding. She brought several books and historical magazine articles to display as she told the wonderful story of her grandfather's 1917 cougar hunt to the North Rim.

2005 Outings

Mike will talk about the planning that went into making this trip a success. There will be slides showing of the difficult country they passed through and the interesting people they met along the way.

March 26 - *Tour of Lonely Dell at Lee's Ferry.* This historic ranch, near the mouth of the Paria River, was home to the families who operated Lees Ferry. The main ranch buildings are about 700 feet up the dirt road from the parking area. The complete tour of the orchard, log cabins, stone ranch house, and pioneer cemetery is about a 1-mile round trip. There are picnic tables and shade trees at the ranch. Take drinking water with you. Scheduled for the same weekend as the Grand Canyon River Guides' Spring Guides Training Seminar at Marble Canyon for those GCHS members who wish to participate in some of the GCRG programs. April 16 - History of El Tovar/Verkamps/Hopi House in celebration of the 100-year anniversary of the El Tovar, Verkamp's Store, and Hopi House [Keith Green, event coordinator]

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Perhaps the most interesting part of her talk was the showing of a film documenting the journey across the Canyon on the Bass Trails. However, the films of her grandfather's adventures were almost lost forever.

Eagle M. Means Jones, Linda's mother, heard about the possible existence of a trunk belonging to her father in the area of Salmon, Idaho. She placed an advertisement in a newspaper and, to her delight, the trunk was returned to the family. Inside were several reels of silver nitrate films, mostly of his travels to Africa. But, one was about his 1917 cougar hunt on the North Rim. Eagle found the Film Restoration Studio in Pennsylvania and she was able to get the combustible film transferred to safety film.

Several personalities were involved in the cougar hunt. Rex Beach, a popular novelist of the time, Fred Stone, of music opera fame, and William Miller, the moving picture camera man. Also, Grand Canyon's Bert Lauzon and W.W. Bass who escorted the Means party down the South Bass Trail, and took them, their horses and their gear across the River using Bass' windlass cable car. The windlass was manned by Canyon cowboy Bill Vaughan. During the crossing, an unfortunate incident occurred that compelled Lauzon to leap from the cable car to the river's edge. Ambrose's horse had managed to fall off the car but remained hanging from a rope around his neck. Realizing they could not rescue the horse before it hung to death, they put him out of his misery and cut him free to tumble down the rocks to the river. Luckily, the cable car did not follow the horse. (There is a photo of this horse reprinted in Buzz Belknap's river guide. For many years when Linda rafted down the Colorado River and used that guide book and seeing the photo over and over again, she never knew until the most recent years that that was her grandfather's horse.)

Some of Uncle Jim Owen's men met the Means party on the north shore and took them to Owen's main camp at Powell Plateau. With no cougars to be found there, they moved on to Swamp Lake and Sublime Canyon where they found several cougars. We didn't see them kill any cougars in the film; the cameraman could not keep up with the hounds. Amusingly, it seemed the main feature of the film at their camps was Pot-Hound, "a sad-eyed old canine, a veteran of many battles...the dean of the cougar pack." According to the engraving on his silver-mounted collar, Pot-Hound had "been at the killing of 450 lions."

Two books, one entitled *Lassoing Wild Animals in Africa* by Guy Scull and the other *Lord of Beasts* by Robert Easton and Mackenzie Brown tell of the African expeditions.

The story of this 1917 film of the Grand Canyon trip was told by Rex Beach in his book entitled *Oh*, *Shoot! Confessions of an Agitated Sportsman*.

GCHS Scholarship

The Grand Canyon Historical Society's scholarship supports research involving history, historic or environmental preservation in the Grand Canyon region.

Any NAU graduate student doing work in the above fields of research is eligible. Eligible projects include: Any work that results in original research concerning historical individuals, events, sites, organizations, businesses or environmental issues in the Grand Canyon region; or any work that results in original research that supports or leads to historical preservation of any historical site, photographs, documents, or diaries with origins in the Grand Canyon region.

To have the project considered complete, one or more of the following end products must be included: (1) Submission of a paper suitable for publication to GCHS by December 1. (2) Presentation of a paper at a legitimate conference with a copy of the paper to GCHS. The copy must be presented to GCHS by December 1 with presentation scheduled at the earliest possible meeting of the conference. (3) A thesis or dissertation of which component parts resulted from the research with a copy of the included work presented to GCHS by December 1. (4) Historical preservation of photographs, documents or diaries requires at least delivery of a photocopy of the items in question to GCHS by December 1. Preservation of actual items is preferred. (5) Site research requires a completed nomination or submission of material to GCHS by December 1 for inclusion in a nomination of the site to the National Register of Historic Places.

Papers and/or items submitted as a result of research will become a part of the GCHS Collection in the Special Collections and Archives at NAU's Cline Library for use by anyone doing research in those subjects involving the Grand Canyon region.

Applications for the GCHS Scholarship may be submitted no later than Friday, February 25, 2005, to:

Balloon Crossing Plaque

In the July 2000 issue of *The Bulletin*, Tom Carmony described about a plaque he saw in Phantom Ranch. *To Commemorate the First Balloon Crossing of the Grand Canyon by Capt. J. Gallagher, M. Otoole, Feb 3rd 1879. God Bless Ireland.*

Warren Tracy, then Manager of Phantom Ranch, provided a little background about the plaque: "The sign you referred to has quite a history. A member of my staff is from Paris. Her sister found it discarded in a dumpster in downtown Paris and sent it to us several years ago."

Now, we have received another bit of information from a gentleman in the United Kingdom with the same last name that is on the plaque. Here is his email from January 5, 2005:

Hi, I also saw one of the plaques in the UK about the crossing of the Grand Canyon by Capt. J. Gallagher. This intrigued me as I am a Gallagher and on finding your site and the information outlined, I dug a little deeper and found this:

Grand Canyon du Verdon – This is in France at a length of 21km and a maximum depth of 700 meters.
