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#### **Sun Shines on the Historical Society**

On June 24, members of the Grand Canyon Historical Society gathered at Shoshone Point on the South Rim for the Society's annual picnic. With the temperature in the 90s and nary a cloud to be seen, the 2006 picnic was a far cry from last year's, held at the ramada by the park's Rec Center due to stormy skies and chilly temperatures. A year ago, we longed for sun, but this time it was too hot and too sunny, as members huddled in two-, three-, or four-person pods under the pinyons and junipers, taking advantage of the shade.

We fired up the grills (gas, due to a parkwide charcoal grill ban) and cooked wieners and brats until no one wanted another. Along with the tubular meat, a variety of side dishes, including potato salad, baked beans, molasses cookies, and tossed salad, left some of us sluggish but happy in the mid-afternoon heat.

GCHS President Mike Anderson, who works for the National Park Service as a cultural resource specialist, told members about many new projects the park service is putting into motion due to the funds made available through the fee-demo program, whereby 80 percent of the entrance fees collected stay at Grand Canyon. The money is to be used for construction projects, and Mike told us that several changes are fast approaching, including expanded parking in Tusayan and next to Canyon View Information Plaza (CVIP), mass-transit (probably busses) from Tusayan to CVIP, limitations on the number of cars allowed in the park, a redesigned Bright Angel trailhead area, and new or revamped bathroom facilities parkwide, among other things. October 21 – *Annual Board Meeting* held at Flagstaff City Library Community Room, 300 W Aspen from 10:00 AM until 12:30 PM.

November 18 – Seeking Summits Below the Rim: The Stories and History of Climbing in Grand Canyon, by Mathieu Brown (2005 GCHS Scholarship recipient). Seeking Summits is a project to document the stories of early climbing in Grand Canyon. Despite the prolific activity of a handful of climbers little has been publicly written and documented on their pursuits. Like any time period in Grand Canyon history, that of the early summiteers carries its own perspectives and adds value and depth to our collective understanding of the Grand Canyon and its influence on the human individual and regional meaning. Although not publicly documented, the knowledge of early Grand Canyon climbing remains rich. It is held in the journals, letters, photographs, and memories of the individuals active in the pursuit. Luckily, many of these stories have yet to vanish and sit waiting to be uncovered and rediscovered from the climbers themselves on a local and regional scale.

### **Grand Canyon Community Book Club**

We had a great discussion last evening about the May book, Vanished Arizona by Martha Summerhayes. This was a true account of a young Army wife fresh from the East Coast and Europe, who married a Lieutenant and was stationed in Territorial Arizona in 1874. There was some initial annoyance with her, as she really was quite whinny about the various situations in which the Army life found her. However, as we gained a greater understanding of her life of wealth and privilege to which she was accustomed, we realized what a shock Yuma would have been to someone who had only been in greener pastures, both geographically and financially. We were totally amazed that she continued to wear starched, white, long (probably heavy) gowns, although she wistfully admired the Mexican women in their light, short-sleeved, off the shoulder peasant blouses. She was a keen observer of the different lifestyles of the various cultures she encountered, from the Native Americans, to the Hispanics, to the Army soldiers constantly shuffled from post to post. Mary Gdula, our facilitator for this book, outdid herself by bringing an enlarged map of Arizona, pinpointing all the locations which the author mentioned in the book. Summerhaves really covered the length and width of the state, long before travel was easy. We got the feeling that her husband was not overly supportive, and left her to work out the details of Army life. But she was severely handicapped by her genteel upbringing, and didn't have a clue about the basics of daily necessities, especially under the rough conditions. She frequently employed soldiers or local women to cook, manage the house & bring up her son. But, after a long career with her husband, a Civil War vet, what she looked the most fondly back on were those early days in Arizona. Her memoir makes a good read.


historical society members will look back on the way the South Entrance gate used to be, although few will pine for the porta-johns that used to be the only bathroom facilities at Shoshone Point.

- his achievements as one of the founders of the Grand Canyon Pioneers Society (now called the Grand Canyon Historical Society) and his ongoing work to solicit and select a recipient for the Society's annual Scholarship Award, and his participation in the selection and presentation of the annual Grand Canyon Hall of Fame Award for Community Service:
- serving the public as an Arizona liaison for the National Parks and Monuments of northern Arizona:
- his assistance with the Arizona Culturekeeps, a statewide historical program recognizing those dedicated to preserving the State of Arizona:
- facilitating the construction of the Arizona State Railroad Museum in Williams, Arizona;
- · his achievements as the founder of the Grand Canyon Railway Museum in Williams, Arizona:
  - and for his work as the historian and museum curator for the Grand Canyon Railway Museum; and
- his revolutionary research of the development, building and historical accounts of the Grand Canyon Railway from Williams to Grand Canyon Village, Arizona, and the resulting publication of that research into the popular books Cowboys, Miners, Presidents and Kings: The Story of the Grand Canyon Railway, plus Rails to the Rim: Milepost Guide to the Grand Canyon Railway and more recently The Grand Canyon Railway: Sixty Years in Color.

Al graciously accepted and said: My thanks to all of you for the honor of the Pioneer Award bestowed upon me. Although I feel more comfortable in the place of presenting awards than receiving them, this honor is one I cherish. In the past 20 years, we have come a long way and accomplished many good things together and I certainly appreciate the camaraderie and all that I have learned from you. The awardees this year are: Sally Wahler and Stanley G. Stephens (deceased).







Bring your camping gear, including a camp stove or gas grill (because of the fire restrictions) if you plan to cook; also, if you wish, a dish to share with the group.
