

### Jacob Lake Campout

Many thanks to the members and guests who attended the July 15 outing at Jacob Lake Ranger Compound. The weather was cool but smoke inversions from the Warm Fire bothered our eyes in the morning before it lifted with the warming temperatures. By 10 o'clock in the morning, the smoke was gone and the rest of the day was just beautiful.

On Friday, Ann Reynolds arrived after spending Thursday night at Kaibab Lodge in De Motte Park. Keith and Nancy Green arrived shortly after Ann drove in.

Also on Friday, John Heyneman came by to see the cabin and barn restorations. John runs the North Rim Ranch for Grand Canyon Trust (GCT), who recently bought the famous Kane Ranch. The new holdings for the GCT include the original Kane Ranch House down in Houserock Valley, and Two Mile Ranch, just up the road from Kane in Buckskin Valley. John was impressed with the work that has been done on the cabin and barn, and hopes to upgrade the cabins held by GCT in the near future.

On Saturday, Mary Ellen Hamilton and Joe Fields arrived, as well as the Homer Family, Tom Gunderson and his friend, and Steve Boyer. Steve is the civiculturest officer for the North Kaibab Ranger District.

Late in the afternoon, after a fine meal of combined efforts, we watched a movie about the life of David Brower. Mr. Brower was responsible for helping the movement to halt the damning of the Grand Canyon. The Bureau of Reclamation, under the direction of Floyd Dominy, were set to build two dams, one in Marble Canyon, and one at Bridge Canyon in the western section of Grand Canyon. These dams, had they been built, would have flooded large sections of Marble and Grand Canyons. Brower, along with the Sierra Club, were able to stop the development of these dams, thus preserving such places as Vasey's Paradise, Redwall Cavern, Silver Grotto, Elves Chasm, and many more special places.

After the movie, we sat around and discussed the history of the area.

November 18 – Seeking Summits Below the Rim: The Stories and History of Climbing in Grand Canyon, by Mathieu Brown (2005 GCHS Scholarship recipient). Seeking Summits is a project to document the stories of early climbing in Grand Canyon. Despite the prolific activity of a handful of climbers little has been publicly written and documented on their pursuits. Like any time period in Grand Canyon history, that of the early summiteers carries its own perspectives and adds value and depth to our collective understanding of the Grand Canyon and its influence on the human individual and regional meaning. Although not publicly documented, the knowledge of early Grand Canyon climbing remains rich. It is held in the journals, letters, photographs, and memories of the individuals active in the pursuit. Luckily, many of these stories have yet to vanish and sit waiting to be uncovered and rediscovered from the climbers themselves on a local and regional scale.
