The Spirit of Grand Canyon

Bob Audretsch entertained and educated the small group of GCHS members with his presentation *The Spirit of Grand Canyon* at the Shrine of the Ages on August 19.

Bob began his talk by sharing his personal history at Grand Canyon. His uncle, Casimar Pultorak,

died in a snowstorm while hiking the Bright Angel Trail in February of 1939. Bob's early training was as a historian and he worked as a librarian for 19 years. He first hiked in Grand Canyon in 1977 and began working there in 1988. He is currently working as an interpretive ranger.

A few years ago he was preparing a program with a geological theme. Wanting to learn what the first explorers had to say about the geology of the Canyon he read from Powell's and Stanton's reports among many others. He was surprised to find many passages in these early works that read as beautifully as any poetry he had ever seen. He dug deeper and found even more examples from the writings of other adventurers, poets and artists. From these findings he decided to develop a program featuring these golden words.

Using a pamphlet he assembled Bob would introduce a certain author or poet and explain a bit about this individuals wanderings at the Canyon. A paragraph or so would be read aloud and Bob invited us to share our understanding of what the author was expressing. Bob had about twenty of these excerpts in his pamphlet. We took turns with the reading. After the program Bob invited us to take the pamphlets home with us.

Bob presents this wonderful program occasionally as part of the evening interpretive series at Grand Canyon. Check the schedule when you are at the Park next and maybe you will be fortunate enough to make up for what you missed at our August outing.

November 18 – Seeking Summits Below the Rim: The Stories and History of Climbing in Grand Canyon, by Mathieu Brown (2005 GCHS Scholarship recipient). Seeking Summits is a project to document the stories of early climbing in Grand Canyon. Despite the prolific activity of a handful of climbers little has been publicly written and documented on their pursuits. Like any time period in Grand Canyon history, that of the early summiteers carries its own perspectives and adds value and depth to our collective understanding of the Grand Canyon and its influence on the human individual and regional meaning. Although not publicly documented, the knowledge of early Grand Canyon climbing remains rich. It is held in the journals, letters, photographs, and memories of the individuals active in the pursuit. Luckily, many of these stories have yet to vanish and sit waiting to be uncovered and rediscovered from the climbers themselves on a local and regional scale.

He has been involved with the Grand Canyon Historical Society for years, an avid hiker - so much so in fact that he hiked, and was actually able to keep up, with Harvey Butchart. He also extensively researched and hiked the historical area of 1919 tramway from Hopi Point to Shiva Temple to the North Rim. Jim also edited J. D. Green's book, *Hiking in the Grand Canyon Backcountry*.

Amanda Zeman lives and works at Grand Canyon National Park, where she is a cultural resource specialist. She works with the park's historical architect, Bob Powell, in the maintenance and rehabilitation of historic properties throughout the park. She earned a Masters Degree from Cornell University in historic preservation. She formerly worked in historic preservation at Petrified Forest National Park, and is the author and coordinator of many canyon historic reports, including a cultural landscape study of Grand Canyon's Mission 66 period.


