Toroweap Geology Campout September 15 & 16

Friends and family are welcome along on this geological show and tell by George Billingsley. This is a car camping trip. You will need a vehicle with good tires and fairly decent clearance. Most cars should do ok as the roads are well traveled. Bring your own camping gear, food, plenty of water, stove, fold up chairs, tents, etc. We will be in the outback country of the Arizona Strip 60 miles from the nearest highway. Be sure to have a good spare tire, check air pressure. Not suitable for large RV's. Cell phones do not work on the Arizona Strip. COME AT YOUR OWN RISK AND EXPENSE

Friday 9/14: Plan to stay at a motel of your choice in Kanab, UT or Fredonia, AZ, or camp out nearby. Be sure to fuel up for the trip. It's about 160 to 175 miles round trip at most.

Saturday 9/15: Meet in Fredonia by 10:00 AM Arizona time (MST) at the North Kaibab Ranger District parking area (430 S. Main) located on the SW side of Highway 89A near the junction with Highway 389. We will travel as a convoy west of Fredonia on Highway 389 about 14 miles to the Toroweap turnoff where we begin the dirt road travel.

Follow the dust across the Arizona Strip. We will make a short geology stop or two on our way to Toroweap Overlook and have lunch. We will spend most of the day walking around the overlook area discussing geology. It could be hot, 95 to 110 F. You will need hat, sunglasses, chapstick, sunscreen, and water. Late afternoon, we will drive back up Toroweap Valley to Mt. Trumbull and camp in the pines near Nixon Spring. No facilities. Elevation is about 7,000 ft.

Sunday 9/16: We will carpool 6 miles to the top of Mt. Logan and hike the last bit to overlook the Arizona Strip and Whitmore Canyon area and discuss geology. We'll then head back down the mountain to stop at Little Springs Volcano and hike about a half-mile into the volcano. Then we'll do lunch and head home.
