Where: Shoshone Point, South Rim, Grand CanyonWhen: 10:00AM gate open, 11:00AM official start 12:00 Noon - Picnic



# **GCHS Scholoarship Award**

This year's scholarship drew six applicants from NAU, ASU and the University of Montana. The latter was accepted by virtue of the fact the individual is working at Grand Canyon National Park and the project was deemed appropriate to the scholarship. Our common complaint is that there is not enough money to award them all a scholarship...tough choices.

Our recipient is Christopher Holcomb, a 24-year-old graduate student in the Environmental Science and Policy master of science program at NAU under Dr. Tom Sisk. This program is also supported by the Center for Sustainable Environments. His application described the Grand Canyon Historical Society P.O. Box 31405 Flagstaff, Arizona 86003-1405

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project as follows:

The purpose of the overall research project is to generate new scientific information and novel policy analysis in order to argue for more seamless management across a jurisdictional boundary on the Kaibab Plateau.

The North Rim encompasses much of the remaining old-growth ponderosa forests left in the Southwest, and important mixed conifer and aspen stands. The jurisdictional boundary between Grand Canyon National Park and Kaibab National Forest along the North Rim is visible from space as an ecological artifact. This simple fact begs a series of questions. My thesis research revolves around three in particular: What is the ecological nature of the apparent differences across the boundary in an otherwise contiguous forest? What are the implications of these disjointed conditions, especially for crown fire risk? What are the past and present management regimes that have created the observed conditions, and what is the potential for more seamless management across this boundary between these two agencies? The highly disjointed ecological conditions which currently exist are a clear symptom of inadequate management for landscape-scale ecological integrity.

This research project addresses important questions, both pure and applied, raised by the boundary phenomenon, using a variety of methods from the fields of forestry, landscape ecology and political science. The historical component of this research that I mentioned earlier is my review of broad trends in management history of these forests, from the original proclamation language of Grand Canyon National Game Preserve in 1893 to the present day. The goal is to provide sound, science-based analysis to aid and inform managers in the world-renowned Grand Canyon region.

As there was no appropriate university gathering for presentation of the award, I met Chris at the Campus Coffee Bean and presented him with the check. He is a personable young man and readily agreed to a presentation for the Society some time in September or after.

On another note, Erik Berg and I attended a paper presentation by last year's recipient, Jennifer Spensieri at the Arizona History Convention in Prescott. It was entitled, "A Kiosk for the Canyon: The Making and Influence of the Grand Canyon Trust as a Professionalized Research-Based Environmental NGO (Non-Governmental Organization)". The following week she successfully defended her thesis. Erik and I agreed that we received fair value for our investment.
