For 30 years spent studying and supporting the Grand Canyon, its human history, and natural sciences.

For compiling a comprehensive bibliography of the Grand Canyon. Since the 1980s, Earle has volunteered his services to maintain this bibliography for the Grand Canyon Association. It is a monumental task listing all literature about the Grand Canyon, especially the sciences. His bibliography is now published on-line by the Grand Canyon Association, and is used by countless researchers.

For his role as co-author of *Quest for the Pillar of Gold*, the definitive mining history book of Grand Canyon.

For serving as an educator and advocate for the Grand Canyon while a naturalist guide on numerous Colorado River trips through Grand Canyon.

For his role in identifying the Kanab Ambersnail (Oxyloma haydeni kanabensis) at Vasey's Paradise.

For his original research and historical account about the life of Eddie McKee, geologist and naturalist of the Grand Canyon.

For his lifelong career in the sciences as geologist, scientific editor, and Archivist at the Academy of Natural Sciences in Philadelphia.

# Hall of Fame Awards GC Rotary Club & William H. Lockridge

The Grand Canyon Historical Society and the National Park Service hereby give recognition to those individuals who have selflessly contributed to the betterment of the Grand Canyon community in years past. This fifteenth annual award names two "individuals" who have shown exemplary service to the Grand Canyon community. The recipients have made personal contributions of money, time, and/or work over a period of many years. Previous recipients of the award and current residents have recommended these honorees. The names of the recipients will be engraved on the permanent plaque housed in the Shrine of Ages.

The **Grand Canyon Rotary Club** was founded in 1946 by such illustrious charter members as Emery Kolb and Jack Verkamp. Over the years Grand Canyon community projects have benefited from funding and personal efforts. For these many years the Grand Canyon and Tusayan communities have benefited from the Club's active participation. These efforts continue to this day for school, fire department, Kaibab Learning Center, and park projects. The club's Holiday Dinner Dance serves not only to provide for these projects, it has also become

the community's premier social occasion. In its role of providing support for the community, the Grand Canyon Rotary Club and its members have established an enviable 66-year tradition of living by the "Service Above Self" motto.

William H. Lockridge was a surveyor of legendary proportions. His surveys of the Grand Canyon Railway and most of the northern Arizona mining claims filed during the late 1800s and early 1900s are still a matter of record in the Coconino County Recorder's Office. "Pop" Lockridge finally settled into the Grand Canyon area. He and his family became a cherished part of the community and served it well in many capacities. In those fledgling years residents and the community frequently needed property, homestead, and claim surveys and cash was always in short supply. Those who needed help the most were recipients of his generosity and skills at no cost or in trade for community services. In this way his skills and those of others benefited the Grand Canyon School and other community buildings. Although times were hard "Pop," in his way, helped to make the Grand Canyon community a better place in which to live.

GCHS President Erik Berg gave the 'State of the Society' address. The 2012 Grand Canyon History Symposium earlier in January has been a smashing success and received a great deal of positive feedback. Richard Quartaroli is leading the proceedings publications team, which is on track to be ready for publication by the end of the year. Because of the interest and attention surrounding the symposium, we saw a significant boost in membership and now have well over 200 active members. We are hoping to continue this momentum going forward and try to plan more gatherings or outings over the course of the year. The president also invited interested members to apply for the GCHS board of directors – elections will be held later this fall for 3-year terms.

Al Richmond presented the **Hall of Fame Awards**. The reward to a living person or organization went to the **Grand** 

Canyon Rotary Club which was founded in 1946 and has included many notable early canyon inhabitants including the Kolbs and Verkamps. The club was recognized for its many contributions to the canyon community including critical support of the schools, fire department, and the Kaibab Learning Center as well as their popular Holiday Dinner Dance. Barbara Shields was on hand to receive the award for the club. The other recipient was William 'Pop' Lockridge, an early canyon settler who surveyed the route of the Grand Canyon Railroad and was well known for his generosity and willingness to help others particularly during the dark economic times of the Great Depression.

Amy Horn presented the **GCHS Pioneer Award** that recognizes individuals who have made major contributions to the preservation and understanding of Grand Canyon history. This year's recipient is noted researcher and archivist **Earle Spamer**. A geologist by training, Spamer works as archivist and editor for the Academy of Natural Sciences in Philadelphia. Spamer has been studying Grand Canyon geology, ecology, and history for over 30 years and has published articles on subjects as diverse as mining in the canyon and the Kanab Ambersnail. For many years, he has been compiling and maintaining a detailed bibliography of canyon publications and resources which has become invaluable to researchers.

## **Historic River Boats Afloat Road Shows**

Over the next month there will be opportunities for you to see one or more of the historic replica boats and hear all about their amazing history. Tom Martin and I will be traveling different paths with presentations across many parts of our western states.

The biggest event will be the **Port Townsend Wooden Boat Festival** in Washington State where some 100,000+ people are expected to attend this three-day event. We will have five replica boats at this festival - Moulty Fulmer's 1953 GEM, Pat Reilly's 1954 Susie R and 1955 Flavell. We will also have Reilly's 1962 Susie Too along with Martin Litton's 1962 Portola. All the replica boat builders will be at the **September 7-9** event: Tom Martin/Gem, Ian Elliot/Susie R & Flavell, Randy Dersham/Susie Too and Greg Hatten/Portola.

For those of you in the **Portland area and SW Washington**, the Oregon Whitewater Association will be hosting a special event on **September 12**. I will be presenting the video *Big Water Runners of the Colorado* and displaying two boats - Susie R and Flavell.

On **Orcas Island** in the San Juan Islands of Washington I will be doing a special showing at the Orcas Center on **September 10**. This event is to honor two river runners who have run their last rapid. Pre Glen Canyon Dam river runner V. R. "Brick" Mortenson lived on Orcas (1973-1998) and Magda "Terry" Mische who we lost this last February. The video *Big Water Runners of the Colorado* and displaying two boats - Susie R and Flavell, will also be part of the presentation.

River guide and author Tom Martin will be giving a 45 minute program based on his new book: *Big Water, Little Boats: Moulty Fulmer and the First Grand Canyon Dory on the last of the Wild Colorado River*. His latest book is wonderfully written and full of amazing photos and information about how today's Colorado River running evolved before Glen Canyon Dam. Tom is a fantastic presenter so if you can attend one of his events I strongly recommend it as fun event for all ages.


