Desert View Outing

GCHS members gathered at the Desert View Watchtower Saturday, October 17th. Each present had at least a running familiarity with architect Mary Jane Coulter. Each of us had been to the iconic structure before. Starting outside with considerations of the site and setting, Ranger Adriann Partrick wrangled our tour for the next hour and a half. With her master's degree on the subject, she gamely fielded questions on everything from the shapes of the windows and grounding of the lightning rods to the fate of the owl chair? (It is in the great kiva room.)

Philosophic considerations were also tendered and discussed. Most agreed that Mary Jane and Hopi artist Fred Kaboti were each extraordinarily talented people who fully embraced the Puebloan culture. How much of the Watchtower then is their 1930's public artistic rendition and how much is a "symbolism" or "prayer" to be altered or expunged? What ongoing changes should happen to the tower for special interest groups? What changes should Park Service interpretationists make? And how much should be "conserved unimpaired for future generations" just as it is, to be enjoyed and interpreted personally by each individual visitor? Would or should the Park Service put a fig leaf on a Michelangelo sculpture?

A Murder At Grand Canyon?

At a small ceremony last April, a gravestone was placed over a 91-year-old unmarked grave at the Grand Canyon Pioneer Cemetery. The person buried there was 29-year-old Elsie Reed


Elsie died of a gunshot wound on July 4, 1924. The death was judged a suicide, but there were no powder burns on her hands. Speculation these days holds that she was actually murdered by her jealous husband. What's more, Elsie may have been fooling around with Martin Buggeln. I wonder if Martin was haunted by that death for the rest of his life.

This information and much more will be in a book being written by Parker Anderson about the Grand Canyon Pioneer Cemetery. He has some interesting observations about the evolution of social mores about suicide and marital infidelity as well.


